

1. Policy Statement	• Drugs of dependence, defined as prescription medications that have a therapeutic need but also a higher potential for misuse, abuse and dependence; even if used as prescribed can have adverse consequences. These medications will not be prescribed at Lincoln Medical Centre until the evidence of clinical need is deemed by the doctor to outweigh the risks of use. A growing body of evidence suggests that if these medications are used for long periods, they can have harmful side effects, including anxiety symptoms, memory and sleep problems, and they can be addictive. We do not recommend long-term use.
	<ul> <li>Lincoln Medical 2024 Ltd has a team approach to the prescribing of drugs of dependence and medications with a higher potential for misuse, which include but are not limited to:</li> <li>Adult methylphenidate</li> <li>Benzodiazepines</li> <li>Dexamphetamine</li> <li>Duromine</li> <li>Methadone</li> <li>Gabapentinoids</li> <li>Medicinal cannabis</li> <li>Opioid analgesics</li> <li>Quetiapine</li> <li>Tramadol</li> <li>Zopiclone</li> </ul>
	• All patients having drugs of dependence prescribed must be made aware that their case will be discussed with the team of GPs to confirm prescribing remains appropriate and within the guidelines of the New Zealand Medical Council guidelines for Good Prescribing Practice.

	<ul> <li>condition. Until such information is available.</li> <li>Your GP may choose not to prescribe any medication.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Your GP may decide not to continue prescribing a medication previously prescribed for you. It may be determined that such a medication is not suitable.</li> <li>Your GP will regularly conduct a urine and/or blood test to ensure that the prescribed medication has been taken and to check for the potential presence of other addictive substances.</li> </ul>

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## **Prescribing Drugs of Dependence Policy**



	<ul> <li>taking your medications, how we will monitor your care and the standard of behaviour that are expected.</li> <li>Patients will have their notes audited and discussed in the Doctor's Team Meeting three-monthly and the result of the team discussion will be documented in their clinical notes.</li> <li>If a patient requests an increase in their medication, the GP will likely review this with a colleague prior to consenting.</li> <li>If there is any doubt about the genuine need for this medication, advice will be sought from a GP colleague.</li> <li>If it appears that there are no demonstrable benefits to daily function or quality of life from the medication, the GP will gradually taper off the dose as directed.</li> </ul>
